What is UMEX?

UONUMA Association for Multicultural Exchange (called UMEX) was set up in May 2002 by the local people and IUJ staff to foster multicultural interaction, support foreign residents and enhance Japanese people's awareness of foreign cultures. Furthermore, UMEX through its various activities in association with the local people helps IUJ students experience "Japan" and thus enrich their knowledge about Japanese people, their culture and social life.

Though IUJ is located in Japan as lots of students say they cannot "feel" real Japan here. It is the result of huge cultural diversity of coming students and the fact that common language of IUJ is English. Before UMEX was established lots of students left IUJ without experiencing what is the tea ceremony, ikebana or kimono.

UMEX in short acts as a cultural bridge between the international students of IUJ and the local community of UONUMA.

Tsunami Relief Effort by UMEX and IUJ students

Two natural disasters occurred in two physically remote areas last year. One was the Chuetsu Earthquake in Niigata Prefecture on October 23, 2004 and another was the Tsunami in the Indian Ocean on December 26, 2004. But the two areas turn out to be very close.

TUSO (Tsunami Uonuma Support Organization) organized by the initiative of UMEX has been trying to establish the linkage between the people of UONUMA and the people in Tsunami affected area through IUJ students. Fund-raising through two fund-raising concerts in March and in April amounted to 1,174,218 yen. 200,000 yen out of it was donated to Minami-Uonuma City as "money gift as a token of sympathy to the people stricken by Chuetsu Earthquake," and, as for the remaining amount of money, 293,000 yen each were distributed to the representatives of four countries; Indonesia, Sri Lanka, Thailand and India. IUJ students and alumni who are working under TUSO project will report their activities to TUSO in October 2005. We would like to welcome you as not only our guests but our partners who can contribute to transforming UONUMA into the multicultural society in which people with various backgrounds can live and work together.

UMEX is not a huge or powerful organization but it overwhelmingly succeeds in arranging charity concerts because all the staff and IUJ students were worked together as a single unit. Countless thanks from me go to dedicated UMEX staff who sacrificed their free time to realize the concerts. Many thanks are also given to IUJ students and honored guests who created those marvelous performances. All the wholehearted support from everybody reminded me that whenever we are in distress, there are always other people who are willing to pull us out of it. For every time you cry, there is always someone nearby to blot your tears.
